


To Be and To Make Disciples of Jesus Christ

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

How do you see God? What image of God do you hold? What stories about God and God's character do you tell yourself? Is God good, cruel, indifferent or does it depend upon the day? Is God up there, down here, in your heart, or all of the above? How we see God matters. It can be the difference between a faith that breathes life and joy into us, or a faith that imprisons us in fear and condemnation.

Psalm 145 is the final psalm of David in the book of Psalms. David was a man who had a long and deep relationship with God, and in this final psalm, David provides us a picture of the God he has come to know and love. Take a minute now to read Psalm 145, focusing especially on verses 8-18.

David describes both who God is and what God does. God is merciful, compassionate, patient, loving, good, generous, and helpful. God lightens our load when we are burdened, provides for our needs, grants our desires, rescues us from danger, and protects us from evil. This is a beautiful picture of God! How does this align with how you see God? If there is some misalignment, that is understandable. How do we reconcile David's picture of God with Bible stories in which entire populations are wiped out in God's name. What about the thousands of children who die of starvation every day in this world? What about the tornado that devastates an entire town? What about the young parents who suffer alongside their sick child? How do we reconcile the picture that David paints of who God is with the harsh realities of this world and the harsh realities of our own lives?

When our vision blurs like that, when we struggle to get a clear picture of who God is, our faith calls us to put on the most powerful corrective lenses: Jesus. Jesus entered into the ugly realities of this world. He did not turn away from cont'd next pg

those realities. He embraced them. And the ugliness of his death, coupled with the beauty of his resurrection, shows us the pattern of what he is doing in this world – beauty from ashes, life from death, light into darkness, all things new. That is what we dare to believe to be true about the God we worship. This is the picture of the God we cling to. No matter what we see in this broken world, above it, below it, around it, and within it, we see a merciful, compassionate, patient, loving, good, generous, and helpful God at work.

Scripture says that Jesus is the full embodiment of God. Apostle Paul, in his second letter to Corinthians, said that Jesus is the image and likeness of God. The God we cannot see is made visible in Jesus. And now we are called to be that embodiment of God in this broken world. We are the living Body of Christ. We are called to live by God's grace and the power of the Holy Spirit in such a way that when people see us, they see a clear picture of the One who dwells in us. We are called to help the world to see and to know the God that David reveals, the God that Jesus reveals.

Highlights of Pastor's Report for Council

- Attending Lutheran Week/NALC Convocation in Oklahoma City August 7th-12th.
- Using vacation time August 13th-20th.
- NALC North Central Ohio Mission District hosting an event on Saturday, September 30th for congregations to gather and build flood buckets for NALC Disaster Response.
- Our current church membership database has been updated. Hoping to transition to a new church database system after having researched 8 other systems. The plan is to start the transition in September and be using it full-time by January 2024.
- Two individuals have expressed interest in joining Holy Trinity's membership.

HTLC Constitution/Bylaws Revision

A committee has been working for months on revising Holy Trinity's Constitution and Bylaws. Their proposed changes were reviewed by the Church Council at its July meeting. The Council voted to accept the committee's proposals with two corrections.

The next step is for HTLC members to vote on the changes at a congregation meeting on Sunday, September 10th. Copies of the document with the changes will be available in the narthex in early August. Notice of the meeting will be sent thirty days prior to the meeting.

The **August Special Offering** envelope supports Harmony House. Harmony House is a 90-day shelter in Mansfield providing food, lodging and case management services to over 500 homeless individuals each year. It is a 54-bed facility for emergency shelter and has a capacity for 34 women and children and 20 men. All monies given to support Harmony House will be matched by Holy Trinity's Tithes on the Bequest and Memorial Fund.

Looking back on the Last 25 Years at HTLC Part 2

This is a new monthly column presenting information in preparation for celebrating HTLC's 75th Anniversary. Dave Erwin researched our archival council minutes for these intriguing facts.

2003

In January the lounge refurbishment was completed with a cost of \$14,840

At a congregational meeting, Church Council President Nancy Grant asked members to become more active in church.

The Church Secretary position was made part-time.

The sanctuary and church office were updated with a total cost of \$12,500.

A Call Committee for a new pastor was formed.

The council is concerned that too much time has been spent on church finances and not enough time on the spiritual health of the congregation.

Pastor Pentti Maki began his ministry at HTLC on December 7th.

The budget for the year had a deficit of \$40,530.11.

2004

Pastor Maki designated the offering for his installation service to go to World Hunger.

The church sound system was improved. Council discussed ways in which to use a \$24,500 bequest. Options included an elevator, a handicap accessible restroom, installing AC in chapel and pastor's office, and repaving the parking lot.

The church treasurer noted that the church is dealing with the same issues as was reported in a letter from an ELCA Interpretation Meeting held in 1991.

2005

At the congregational meeting in January, Council President Nancy Grant asked everyone to put on "rose colored Jesus glasses" to see what needs to be changed.

A feasibility study for elevator and handicap accessibility was begun.

Members were surveyed concerning the use of the chapel. The majority wanted to keep the space as currently used and update it to make it better.

Kathy Glessner became Council President in May after Nancy Grant moved to North Carolina. She will fill in the term which ends in October.

The new AC was purchased at a cost of \$16,560. The parking lot was repaved at a cost of \$13,200. A new kitchen stove was purchased.

Fifty-eight members returned reviews for Pastor Maki. Reviews were very positive.

The income for the year was \$218,413.02. Disbursements were \$233,791.23.

Make plans now to attend the special events and celebration of Holy Trinity's 75th Anniversary in October. Watch for announcements in bulletins and upcoming newsletters!

There will be no Church Council meeting in August.

The Gospel according to Michael Smith, organist (as recorded by Barney) A variation of Matthew 20:1-16

Before the last practice, the pastor tells the organist, Michael, to gather all the singers to pay them, beginning with Perry, then Carol, Barb & Jerry, Phyllis and Karen.

When Perry and Karen were paid, each received \$1.10 and a Klondike bar, as did Carol, Barb & Jerry, and Phyllis.

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So when Kathy, Bonnie, Mary, Dick & Nancy, Bobbie, Dave & Jean, Nancy and Barney came to Michael, they assumed they would receive much more. Perhaps a coupon for an entire box of Klondike bars from Kroger's.

They protested! Especially Barney.

"We sat every Thursday morning in an unheated choir loft in sweat shirts, stocking caps, scarves, winter coats and sometimes, under blankets, while these others come here in late summer or early spring and get the same pay."

"Barney, my friend," said Michael, "I did you no wrong. Did you not agree to sing all year for \$1.10 and a Klondike bar? Take it and go."

"It is my desire to pay you all the same. Is it against the law to give away my money if I want to? Should you be angry because I am kind?"

And so it is that the last shall be first and the first last.

Life Line Screening, the nation's leading provider of preventive health screenings, will offer affordable, non-invasive and painless health screenings at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church on Wednesday, September 6, 2023.

A package of four screenings to identify risk for stroke, heart disease and other chronic conditions will be offered:

Carotid Artery Screening (Plaque)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.

Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening

An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.¹

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Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.

blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.²

Atrial Fibrillation

A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation. AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.²

These 4 vital screenings take 60-90 minutes to complete.

Here at Holy Trinity we take our quilts to Jerusalem Lutheran Church in Seville, Ohio. From there they are transported to Lutheran World Relief warehouse in Maryland, United States.

Our quilts from last year may have gone to any one of the following countries: Angola, Armenia, Georgia, Jordan, Lebanon, Mali, Poland, South Sudan, Syria and Ukraine.
