

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The church elders sat in the dark room looking up at the ceiling. At least, that's what they thought they were doing. It was too dark to really tell.

"It was a good lightbulb," one elder said, mournfully. All agreed.

"I remember when we used to have Bible studies in this room. Before the light went out," another reminisced.

"And council meetings," added a third.

"My daughter had confirmation classes here. But that was years ago," said a fourth.

"It really was a good lightbulb," the first elder repeated. All agreed.

"Perhaps we should get a new lightbulb," a new voice in the room suggested. Silence.

After a time, an elder said, "We tried that. But it didn't work."

Another added, "And we are out of lightbulbs."

A third said, "And, even if we did have one, there is no one who can change it. We're getting too old for ladders."

The fourth said, "I could ask my daughter, but she doesn't come here anymore."

A thoughtful silence filled the room.

"It really was a good lightbulb," the first elder said with heavy sadness, then added, "I just wish the light would come back." And all agreed.

After another long, awkward silence, there was a shuffling in the room. A chair moving. Footsteps across the tile floor. "Then maybe," the new voice said, "we should just open the blinds."

Sunlight. 1

If you have been involved in a congregation's life for some time, you have probably sat with these elders in the dark room and considered the burned-out lightbulbs in the congregation's life, those yearnings for the way things used to be. Yearnings for the days when there were 100 kids in

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Sunday school, two dozen people singing in the choir, when women did not work outside the home while raising young children, when everyone looked forward to the Sunday School picnic, when church was central in society and therefore on Sundays everyone would not think about going anywhere until they went to church first. Those were the days . . .

And now we are left to adjust to the world without what we have lost. We have to change ourselves to adapt to the changed world in which we find ourselves. We have to open the blinds on our loss and let the sunlight shine into our lives in new ways. But will we welcome the sunlight? Will you welcome the sunlight?

Here's a test: How would you respond if you're peacefully sleeping in your bedroom with room darkening shades, and someone enters your room and opens them up allowing the bright morning sun to shine right into your face? Would you hide under your bed sheets, grumbling about someone being so rude? Or would you welcome the sunlight, looking forward to getting the day started?

Truth is, when it comes to opening the blinds and welcoming the sunlight, some love it, while others, not so much, especially if they are not the ones opening the blinds. And some need more time than others to prepare themselves for the sunlight. Only when they have time to prepare themselves can they then welcome the sunlight. And the same holds true for the life of the church, the body of Christ.

Paul's words to the Romans penned approximately 1,966 years ago speak to us today: I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and

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and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God – what is good and acceptable and perfect (12:1-2).

In order for this body of Christ, Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, to adapt to the changed world in which we find ourselves we have to find the courage to open the blinds on our loss and welcome the sunlight that God is shining into our lives. And it is possible for us to do so while not forgetting the roots of our faith and all that shapes our identity. However, it will require all of us to participate because we all have a necessary and important function in this body of Christ called Holy Trinity Lutheran Church. As Paul tells us in Romans 12:4-5: For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another.

This month we are making final preparations to celebrate Holy Trinity's 75th Anniversary throughout the entire month of October. I encourage you to take part in as many of the activities as you can. More importantly, I encourage you to give of yourself as requests for help are made. Until then, welcome the sunlight. I look forward to seeing you in worship and actively participating in the many ministries that Holy Trinity offers.

HTLC Constitution/Bylaws Revision

A committee has been working for months on revising Holy Trinity's Constitution and Bylaws. Their proposed changes were reviewed by the Church Council at its July meeting. The Council voted to accept the committee's proposals with two corrections.

The next step is for HTLC members to vote on the changes at a congregation meeting on Sunday, September 10th. Copies of the document with the changes will be available in the narthex in early August. Notice of the meeting was mailed the first week of August

Looking back on the Last 25 Years at HTLC

This is a new monthly column presenting information in preparation for celebrating HTLC's 75th Anniversary. Dave Erwin researched our archival council minutes for these intriguing facts.

2006:

Jim Fleming replaces Joel Marnhenke as Council President. He will serve for two years.

The large air conditioner was replaced at a cost of \$18,350.00.

Carol Bertholf volunteered to be the church librarian.

Pastor Diana Seaman resigns as youth director.

A feasibility committee discussed an elevator which would cost approximately \$200,000.

Jean Huffman becomes mentor coordinator.

2007:

The "Elevating Holy Trinity Together Project" estimated cost is \$248,000. This includes handicap access and bathrooms.

The Youth Group donated \$1,274.32 from craft and bake sales to the elevator fund.

At the year end, the elevator is 75% complete. When funds raised are compared to expenses, there is a deficit of \$68,300.00.

2008:

Donations for the Elevator Fund includes \$7540.14 from Trinity Ashland, and \$3,559.9 from rummage sale. The total cost of the elevator project was \$242,196.11. The total money raised was \$173,583.60. The total borrowed from the bequest fund was \$68,612.51. The last payment was made on June 19th.

Pastor Maki started Faith Friends.

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2009:

The Archive Room was established. The committee who worked on the project included Joan Albert, Carol Myers, John O'Neil and Betty Snively.

Marian Pendleton Scholarship Fund was established.

The problems with the elevator were described and sent to the Better Business Bureau.

Eighty-four members distributed 2,391 flyers in the community to advertise VBS and our summer mid-week services.

Issues with the ELCA were brought up at a meeting.

2010:

Bishop Elizabeth Eaton of the ELCA sends a letter in response to our concerns about the passage of "Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust."

Members were polled about redirecting ELCA benevolence to other related Lutheran projects.

In March, Sue and Bill Schamadan submitted a letter asking to plan for a columbarium.

The five-year proposed "Core Values and Bedrock Beliefs" was passed by the congregation.

In April, HTLC voted to add its name to resolution to repeal the sexuality document passed by the ELCA in 2009.

The Seminary Fund for Carol Kilgore was replenished.

Cara Fehr resigned as Church Secretary. Cassandra Brown was hired to replace her.

Jonathan Scheidt updated the council on the church website. Windows 7 was installed on the pastor's laptop and Secretary's computer.

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2010, cont'd:

Air conditioning was installed in the Chapel. Ray Gantzler completed the electrical work.

At the October Church Council Meeting, members voted to place on the ballot at a congregational meeting this resolution: "Holy Trinity Lutheran Church should terminate its relationship with the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America." Bishop of the ELCA Elizabeth Eaton spoke to the congregation on October 24th. The meeting was held on October 31st after the Reformation service. The rationale for such a move was that the" Social Statement of Human Sexuality, sections of which members believed to be in direct contradiction to the teachings of the Holy Scriptures, and the Lutheran Confessions. The attendance at the October Congregational Meeting was 123. The result of the vote was as follows: 109 in favor of withdrawing from the ELCA; 23 not in favor of withdrawing from the ELCA. The second resolution that passed was the request to join the North American Lutheran Church. Meetings on the subject will continue in January, 2011.

Life Line Screening, the nation's leading provider of preventive health screenings, will offer affordable, non-invasive and painless health screenings at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church on Wednesday, September 6, 2023.

A package of four screenings to identify risk for stroke, heart disease and other chronic conditions will be offered:

Carotid Artery Screening (Plaque)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the carotid arteries (a pair of blood vessels in the neck that deliver blood to your brain) for buildup of fatty plaque. This buildup, called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.

Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening

An Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. It is important to screen for PAD because it increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, or stroke.¹

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Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm (AAA)

An ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. AAA can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.

blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.²

Atrial Fibrillation

A 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) is performed by placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for Atrial Fibrillation. AFib can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.²

These 4 vital screenings take 60-90 minutes to complete.

Teacher materials, including dry erasers and paper towels, were collected in August for Mansfield school teachers. The dry erasers were a big hit last year!


A motion was made to donate \$500 directly to the Malawi Orphan Care Project in Phyllis McPhern's name. We will continue to support this great endeavor.



Bishop Selbo is reelected

The Rev. Dr. Dan Selbo was reelected as bishop of the North American Lutheran Church by delegates to the 2023 NALC Mission Convocation Aug. 9-11 in Oklahoma City.

More than 600 delegates and visitors gathered for the convocation around the theme, "Missio Dei: The Work and Mission of God." The convocation and the events preceding it comprise the NALC's biennial Lutheran Week.



Bishop Selbo received 77 percent of the votes for bishop. The Rev. Dr. David Wendel, assistant to the bishop for ministry and ecumenism, was the other nominee for bishop.

Other Elections: Julia Hartfelder of Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church in Westerville, Ohio, and the Rev. Dr. Scott Ness, pastor of Prince of Peace Lutheran Church in Fayetteville, Georgia, were elected to four-year terms on the Executive Council. The Rev. Leslie Haines, executive director of Lutheran Military Veterans and Family Ministries in Fort Wayne, Indiana, and the Rev. Ryan Henkel, pastor of Emmons Lutheran Church in Emmons, Minnesota, were elected to the Court of Adjudication.

"On Fire for Mission" sessions made the convocation a Mission-Driven gathering. Two-hour blocks of time each day focused on domestic mission, international mission and mission related to congregational life. Dr. David Luy of the North American Lutheran Seminary opened the sessions with a reflection on Scripture, and NALC staff members provided presentations on each day's theme. Delegates then talked about the presentations and discussed ways to "take it home" to their congregations.

Six new NALC Global Workers were commissioned: Randy Stubbs in Tanzania; the Rev. Sam Chim in Cambodia; the Rev. Dr. Thomas Thorstad in Laos; the Rev. Dr. Slavomír Slávik in Slovakia; the Rev. Aleksandr Gröss in Ukraine; and Dagaga Gamechu in Kenya.

The ministry of the Rev. Dr. Gemechis Buba, assistant to the bishop for international mission, was celebrated. He will now be serving the NALC part time from Ethiopia and will expand his teaching and leadership ministries around the world.

Randy Stubbs, a new NALC global worker in Tanzania, and his daughters delighted delegates with their music throughout the convocation. His ministry training church musicians and pastors in Tanzania was highlighted at the convocation banquet.

The Rev. Dr. Yonas Yigezu Dibisa, president of the Ethiopian Evangelical Church Mekane Yesus, was the preacher for the closing service of Holy Communion.

A large increase in the number of candidates for ministry preparing to become NALC pastors was celebrated by the convocation.

A \$3.8 million budget was approved for the NALC for 2024. The budget anticipates spending some of the church's reserve funds. Congregations are encouraged to support the NALC with at least 5-8 percent of their regular offerings.

Today, Tomorrow & Forever 2020 Vision appeal has received \$2 million in pledges toward its \$5 million goal.

The Braaten-Benne Lectures in Theology preceded the convocation. The theme for this year's lectures was "God the Father Creates ... in His Image (Genesis 1:27)."

Other Lutheran Week events included a Faith Formation Festival, the Women of the NALC Gathering, the Lutheran Theologians for the Church Conference, the Global Confessional and Missional Forum, and a gathering of Latino church leaders from across the NALC. A variety of workshops were also offered for delegates.
