

#### **Highlights of Pastor's Report**

- Debbie Taylor and I propose we upgrade our church database to a cloud-based system, ICON-CMO. Eight other systems were researched, including our current database, Church Windows. ICON-CMO is the most economical for what we need.
- Two individuals requested to join our membership: Tom Riester and Perry Kent.
- A Stewardship Committee has been established (Yvonne Smith, John Tipton, Tom Riester, Carol Bertholf, and myself). We are reading Abundance: Creating a Culture of Generosity, and working out a plan for emphasizing stewardship throughout the entire year with monthly temple talks, newsletter articles, social media, and/or videos.
- Sometime before the end of the year the council should set aside some time (outside of our normal meetings) to work on establishing our core values and setting 3-4 goals for us to work on for 2024.

#### Remembering "Elevating Holy Trinity Together"

One of the largest undertakings of HTLC in recent years was making the church handicap accessible. The initial meeting with a contractor was held in January of 2005. After a walk through, the contractor estimated the cost to be around \$100,000. A Feasibility Committee was formed in March of 2006. Members included Larry Feichtner, Jim Fleming, Jerry Unruh, John Pierce, Dick Collier, and Terry McKinley.

The council approved presenting the project to the congregation in October of 2006. The proposal included an elevator, two chair lifts, refit of two restrooms, and repairing front doors and window leaks. The cost was now estimated at \$248,000. Financial options were investigated. In July of 2007, Larry Feichtner, Chairperson of "Elevating Holy Trinity Together" announced that the campaign had raised \$165,346. Calls and home visits were conducted by member teams. It was decided that the Baptismal Font would have a basket to receive the collection on Miracle Sunday, July 2007. The Task Force hoped that the campaign would raise the level of spiritual awareness of our members and create a closeness among our members. An Expression of Faith booklet containing statements and prayers was produced to inspire HTLC members.

The dedication of the Handicap Accessibility Project was held on May 18, 2008. The hymn chosen for the event was "Blest Be the Ties That Bind." Chair Larry Feichtner commented that the project was the work of the Lord. He quoted Dietrich Bonhoeffer who wrote "The church is the church only when it exists for others."

#### **Journey** to the Joy of Giving

a Stewardship Micro Message from North American Lutheran Church Living and Giving Ministry

Just as Christians grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ, it's a fact that we also grow in our understanding and practice of Christian stewardship. There are no doubt some people, who, with their very first offering, feel a sense of joy. But I think for many people, it's a more of a progression that may differ from person to person.

Experiencing joy in giving is often far more caught than taught. Yes, we can learn from scripture and other people. When we find someone who is an inspiration for us, someone with whom the gospel shines, their faith and their joy can be contagious. Barring those explosive encounters with the Gospel in the witness of others, real joy in giving may progress more slowly—but it will come. Joy is a by-product of being a Christian.

STEP ONE in giving might well be duty. Many of us were taught to give by parents or grandparents. Either as children or as new converts to Christianity, we have yet to reach the maturity that comes as we grow in grace and knowledge of the Gospel. Giving from a sense of duty does not mean a lack of commitment. it is a meaningful experience, but it may not reach the level of real joy.

**STEP TWO** may begin when we find great satisfaction in giving. When a Christian child earns their first paycheck, there is great satisfaction in being able to put their offering in the plate. One gets to give. Giving is satisfying and fulfilling, yet may not reach the level of joy.

**STEP THREE** might well be when we grow to giving to God from a sense of gratitude. This is a big step! Giving is no longer

just giving to a church; it's now become giving to God in gratitude for all that Christ has done. At this point, real joy begins to come alive.

There may be other steps for some; the journey can be traveled rather quickly, or it may take some time. others give to special offerings and, through that, find joy.

There once was a guy named Guy. Guy only occasionally put a large chunk of money in the offering, but he tended to give toward special needs. When Guy invited himself to a Church Council meeting, the members cringed. They all respected Guy, but he was a blunt person, and they also had a bit of fear.

At one such meeting, everyone greeted Guy cordially, though without much enthusiasm. The president of the congregation gave Guy a spot on the agenda right after the devotions.

When the chair called on Guy, he got right down to business. He said, "I know the council has been discussing a new copy machine. I hear there are three being considered. If you'll buy the best one, I'll cover the cost. Also, we've been collecting money for a chair lift for a long time. I have decided to finish paying for it. Our church is getting older, and we dare not wait around too long."

For many people, finding joy in giving comes much like it did for Guy. The council blessed and thanked Guy for his generosity, and not only did Guy write a check for both special needs, his regular giving to the church also went up.

The journey to joy may be different for everyone, but joy in giving should be intrinsic to every Christian.


The Food Pantry continues to need our **Sunday Food donations**. They are always appreciative of our contributions and we will continue to deliver what is brought in on Sundays.



#### Are You the Key?

Are you carrying any extra keys around? Having a bunch of keys doesn't mean knowing where they fit or how to use them.

Six years ago, I received a phone call from Pastor Maki. After pleasantries were exchanged, he asked if I would consider becoming Church Council President. I am sure he made several calls prior to this with negative responses. I could have easily said no, too, but a voice in my head said "think about it." I had experience being president of our local League of Women Voters. The LWV is known for reaching consensus after studying relevant issues. Do I have the right set of keys? I now credit the Holy Spirit for moving me to call him the next day with a positive response. I have no regrets. Responsibility and commitment resulted in my spiritual and emotional growth.

Within the first few months, we faced a financial crisis; once the turmoil was over, we came back stronger. The Church Council promised transparency and knew it had to regain trust of its members. Each council member became more focused on these goals. Meetings no longer lasted three hours. Our only agenda was to improve. We were making progress when COVID struck.

Pastor Maki tried to be innovative by recording sermons, when we realized that our lack of technical capabilities was a real drawback which needed to be addressed. As Pastor Maki made the decision to retire in 2022, we were faced with forming a call committee. Some members I asked were hesitant and needed to be convinced that they possessed a necessary key to finding us a new pastor. With the encouragement of a dynamic interim, we reached a consensus on our traditional worship service. Dr. Hall prepared us for new pastor and the Holy Spirit led us to calling Pastor Kathy Pennington. Her success is our success. Increased attendance is only one of the positives she has brought. Our technological advances will be key factors in remaining relevant. We are indeed looking forward.

I have joked that I am counting down the last three months. There is a reason that there are term limits for Council positions in our Constitution. A fresh perspective is needed. In November, we will be seeking members to be nominated for President, Finance Chair, and Worship and Music Chair. Leadership is just one of the necessary keys. Sharing leadership with each other keeps us focused on the servant example of Christ. If we keep track of the keys together, we'll know why they're there and perhaps some long-closed spiritual door will be opened for us.
