

To Be and To Make Disciples of Jesus Christ



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Christmas is the celebration of the good news that God so loves the world that God became a part of it in the frail flesh of a child. Despite our best efforts to keep him out, God simply intrudes. The life of Jesus is bracketed by two impossibilities: a virgin's womb and an empty tomb. God entered our world through a door marked "No Entrance" and left through a door marked "No Exit." Over and over again, the Christmas story reminds us that God shows up where we least expect him, especially among those who think they are the least deserving. Christmas is the good news that God is with us, and God is for us.

The King of Kings was not born to a princess in a palace. He was born to a simple girl and laid in a manger. The Prince of Peace was not adorned with velvet robes. He was wrapped in swaddling clothes. The good news of the Savior's birth was not announced to heads of state, but to shepherds out watching their flocks by night.

The Creator of all things, the mysterious One, becomes visible, small and vulnerable. And while this is good news for all people, it is especially good news for those who know they don't deserve it, those who don't have it all together, those who know they haven't got a prayer, those who often feel small and vulnerable, those who know their lives are broken beyond repair, those who know beyond a shadow of doubt that they are in bondage to sin and cannot free themselves. It is to such as these that Christmas announces this great good news: God is with us and God is for us.

So many people seem to think that God is only with and for the "good" people, whoever they are. But Christmas announces the good news that, no matter how unworthy other people might think we are of God's love, or how unworthy we might think we are of God's love, God is for us and God is with us. God chooses to love and forgive us. No matter who you are, no matter where you've been, no matter what you've done or have failed to do, God's love is for you — not because you're good, but because God is. And yet so

many of us seem to struggle with this reality.

Let the story of Christmas point you to the truth that sets us free: God's love is not based on our worthiness, but on God's goodness and grace in Jesus Christ. God is with us, and God is for us. God has entered into the mess of this world and into the mess of our lives to for-

give us, to restore us, to set us free.

None of us deserves it. None of us has it all together. None of us has a prayer. All of us are small and vulnerable. Each of our lives is broken beyond repair. Beyond a shadow of a doubt, we are all in bondage to sin and cannot free ourselves. And so, God has climbed into this world and into our lives, not because we deserve it, but because we need it and because God loves us. God is with us, and God is for us. That is the good news, and the gift of Christmas.

Dec. 3, 2023

Attendance: Members who attended the 10:00 service and stayed for the meeting. (49 voting members)

Call to Order: Carol Bertholf called the Congregational meeting to order at 11:20 am on Dec. 3, 2023 in the church sanctuary. Pastor Pennington opened the meeting with prayer. A quorum was established. Carol thanked the members of the congregation for staying for the meeting. She presented the written ballot to the congregation and members voted by written ballot. Two Council members counted the vote. The positions were filled as follows:

Council President: Bonnie Elias: 3-year term

Worship and Music Chair: Barbara Fraifogl: 3-year term

Finance Committee Chair: Don Karger: 3-year term

Endowment Committee: Becky McKinley: 3-year term

Endowment Committee: Doug Rhodes: 3-year term

Endowment Committee: Sue Hendrickson: 2-year term

2024 Budget: Carol introduced Don Karger who presented the proposed budget. The proposal had been reviewed and approved by both the Finance Committee and Church Council. The proposed budget had been made available to the congregation for their review shortly after it was approved at the Nov. 14, 2023 Council meeting. He highlighted areas of the budget. Questions were raised and answered.

Then, Don moved that the Proposed 2024 Budget be accepted as presented. Jim Fleming seconded. Members voted by written ballot. The motion was approved with 48 yes votes and 0 no votes.

Pastor Kathy thanked Carol Bertholf for her six years of leadership as Chairman of the Church Council.

Carol reminded committee chairs that their annual reports are due by Jan. 19, 2024 and that pictures should be included.

The meeting was closed with prayer by Pastor Kathy Pennington.

Adjournment: There being no other business, Jim Fleming moved and Always Butz seconded that the meeting be adjourned. Carol adjourned the meeting at 11:45 am.

Defining Stewardship

When Adam opened his eyes in Eden, he didn't have a fig leaf to his name. Yet God had given him a voice, fingers, toes and a smile fashioned after God's own grin. The Lord invited Adam into a mission to take these gifts and use them to "work and keep" creation alongside God in the garden. We know Adam offered his voice, naming the beasts and birds. We can imagine he stooped to bury seeds in soil. Maybe he saw his reflection in a stream and recognized that he belonged to Godhow could he not when their images were the same? - and so did everything around him.

If Adam, in some small moment before the fall realized this and set out with enthusiasm to care for it alongside our God, then Adam grasped the profound meaning of stewardship. Many of us have more than fig leaves to our name. Even after we fell into sin, God never stopped being generous—what does it mean to have a God who stitched Adam and Eve clothes as they were sent from the garden, and who likewise has blessed us? Every bit of our time, talent, treasure and testimony is a gift form God to his people.

As stewards of his resources, we are those called to take stock, recognizing that God has given us all that we have and all that we are with love and with purpose. Our minds, bodies, voices, bank accounts, cars, homes, families—all are gifts from God to be folded into his story. Our voices may be lifted in praise, our homes and hearts opened to those in need, and our resources dedicated to the building up of his kingdom.

To even be included in this mission is a mark of God's grace. What Adam realized too late about stewardship is that

its greatest barrier is greed. He and Eve wanted for themselves what was set aside for God alone. Sin entered into this world because in greed, our first parents wrapped their hands tightly around what belonged to God.

How often do we find ourselves wrapping our hands around what belongs to God and refusing to let go? That crafty old serpent still whispers that we should live for ourselves, keep what is in our possession, but God has always been more generous than that. In the waters of baptism, he quiets that old serpent and restores the mission of stewardship. We are invited to work and to care for all that belongs to God, walking alongside him as he cares for his creation, his children and his Church, just as Adam and Eve first walked alongside him in the garden. Just as they first dedicated everything they had to the task, we are invited to do the same.

God wants all of us to be part of the story of stewardship—from the infant whose baptism if a testimony to God's grace, to the widow whose two coins ensure that the church is able to buy Bibles for the next generation, to the man willing to shovel snow on Sunday morning.

We walk into this mission with bold faith in our Lord. Because he has been generous with us, he will be generous with what he will do with us too. Being a steward is being unafraid to dedicate all that we are and all that we have to working and taking care of God's world because we know how this ends: with mountains breaking into song, with the hungry filled with good things, with the dead being raised to new life.

It ends where it began—where we began—in the hands of our God.


