Dear Sisters & Brothers in Christ,

There is no question that society is trying to make the Church unimportant in various ways. And, it has been increasingly doing so as each decade passes by. As individual members of the Body of Christ, I warn us to be

careful about how we get caught up in the societal trends. What do I mean? Well, without realizing it, our decisions and actions can encourage the wayward ways of society. Since wedding season is fast approaching, I'm going to get on my soap box.

Let's talk about our family member or friend becoming "ordained" online through Universal Life Church to officiate a wedding. It's bad enough that this has been happening for years, but lately I have been seeing photos with the wedding officiant wearing a clerical shirt with collar, and sometimes, with a stole. Such behavior makes a mockery of the Church, and even God. Now, I realize all professions are mocked in various ways. Sometimes it is simply done for comical entertainment, sometimes it is done to put down the profession. I don't mind someone wearing a costume that includes clerical vestments if they are in a theater performance or are simply playing "dress-up" for home or Halloween. That is not what I am speaking about here.

What I am talking about is individuals playing dress-up on top of being ordained without having gone through any form of formal theological education and being vetted by a denomination's candidacy or ordination committee. To be ordained is to be set apart from laity to clergy. A lot of responsibilities are laid upon the ordinand. I won't name them all here, but the proclamation of God's Word as well as the spiritual care of God's people are two of the responsibilities. How many of these weddings officiated by a so-called "ordained" officiant truly invite God into the ceremony? Are the holy scriptures read? Does someone preach the Word of God? Do the wedding vows make God part of the marital

relationship?

Now let's talk about attire. The clerical shirt and collar, and the stole are historic signs of the office of ordained ministry. They identify for other people the wearer's role and responsibilities. Also, they serve as a powerful reminder of that role and its responsibilities to the one who wears it. When one wears their professional uniform for any profession – it indicates that their actions, as well as their appearance, are to be uniform, that is, following certain standards rather than just being determined by their own preference or whim. There is a trust that is extended to the one wearing the uniform. When so-called "ordained" wedding officiants wear the uniform of clergy are they aware of the meaning and responsibilities of the said uniform? Because the uniform represents so much more than just playing officiant for the day. The clerical collar covers the voice box. It serves as a stark reminder that the pastor is called by God and the Church to proclaim the truth of Scripture. The stole is a symbolic yoke – like that worn by oxen or other draft animals – to indicate that the wearer carries the responsibilities for the spiritual care of God's people. When worn in public – even if just at a wedding ceremony - the wearer may be called on by others to answer questions about the Bible, Church, and faith. They may be asked for guidance or prayer from people disconnected from the Church. They may be pulled into emergency situations and perhaps even into restricted areas to officiate the sacrament of Holy Baptism and/ or Holy Communion. Are these so-called "ordained" wedding officiants willing to bear these responsibilities?

My request to you, my flock, (I am your shepherd), is for you to discourage your family members and friends from using and/or becoming so-called "ordained" wedding officiants. More importantly, teach them why. Help them understand the role of the Church in society.

HTLC Annual Meeting Minutes February 4, 2024

Call to Order: Bonnie Elias called the meeting to order at 11:25 am on Feb. 4, 2024 in the church sanctuary.

Quorum Established: Attendance at the meeting was 55, so a quorum was established.

Prayer: Provided by Pastor Kathy Pennington.

New Business:

Recommended Distribution of Earnings of the Endowment Fund Principal Investment: Jonathan Butz reviewed the Endowment Committee's report on page 23 of the Annual Report for 2023. He presented information about the 5 applicants requesting monetary assistance. The Endowment Committee approved distribution of the funds as printed in the report. Church Council voted to accept this proposal to be presented to the congregation at today's meeting. Bonnie Elias moved that the congregation approve the Endowment Committee's proposed distribution of funds as listed in their report. Marilyn Zuber seconded the motion. There being no further discussion, an oral vote was conducted. The motion passed unanimously.

Therefore, the following organizations will receive the amounts listed:

- ♦ Malawi Orphan Care Project, \$1,000 (Feeding 1,000 children for 2 weeks)
- ♦ Malawi Orphan Care Project Refurbishing Outdoor Kitchen, \$3,000
- ♦ Love Our Hero's, \$2,500 (Home for a Hero The Ron Project)
- ♦ Zoe's Learning Center, \$1,000 (Easter Celebration 2024, Dinner Party and Family Support)
- ♦ Life Wise Madison, \$1,068 (Student cost \$20 each, Bibles and Operating Expenses)

Reports:

Pastor's Annual Report: Pastor Kathy Pennington highlighted that parts of her annual report on pages 6 &7 of the <u>Annual Report for 2023</u> booklet.

Council President Report: Carol Bertholf reviewed information listed in her report on page 8 of the <u>Annual Report for 2023</u> booklet. The 75th Anniversary Celebration activities that were so inspirational.

Finance Committee Report: Don Karger reviewed his report as printed on pages 12-15 of the booklet.

Brief Committee Presentations:

<u>Parish Education</u>: Always Butz summarized highlights of the report printed on page 16 of the booklet. She requested support of the high school graduate scholarship that is about 1/3 of the needed funding. (We award \$1,000 each year.)

Worship & Music: Barbara Fraifogl recognized the members of the committee and subcommittees and thanked them for their service. She requested volunteers for the Altar Guild and other ways to serve the church. She thanked Kathy Glessner for her 6 years of leading this committee. Kathy's report is on page 18 of the booklet.

<u>Property Committee</u>: Jerry Unruh provided highlights from his report on page 19 of the booklet. He explained some of the unexpected costs, such as repairing the chair lift in the lower hallway and repairing the leaking hot water line. He thanked the members for all the work that they do to help maintain our facilities.

Outreach Committee: Jean Erwin's report is on page 20 of the booklet.

<u>Comfort Makers Quilt Group</u>: Bonnie Elias spoke for this committee as she is a member. Sue Hendrickson's report is on page 22 of the booklet. Both Bonnie and Sue thanked the members for their time and talents given to this group.

St. Luke's Meals: Bonnie asked Elaine Bishop to talk about this group. Her report is on page 21 of the booklet. The program fed increasing numbers of people in 2023. (See her report.) She thanked all who have participated, and she also talked about the dinner that will be provided on Feb. 24, 2024.

<u>Staff Support</u>: Bonnie reported that this committee's chairman will not serve on HTLC Council but will keep the council members updated on their activities. Carol Bertholf serves as Chairman 2024-2026.

Tithes on the Bequest and Memorial Funds: Bonnie announced that these funds are low.

Wish List Items for Worship and Music: Bonnie suggested that new wish list items as discussed by Barbara Fraifogl be given to Barbara or Kathy Glessner.

Adjournment: There being no other business, Yvonne Smith moved and Jim Fleming seconded that the meeting be adjourned. Bonnie adjourned the meeting at 12:10 pm. She encouraged all who were able to stay for the Scout Troop 152's Pancake fundraising lunch in the Social Hall.

Guided to the Cross



AN ENDOWMENT NOTE

Purpose of the Endowment Fund

"To enhance the work of the church by reaching out to those within our own congregation and beyond its doors through monetary assistance."

A person can be generous in many ways, such as giving his/her time and talents to causes that matter to him or her. One way in which you can demonstrate your values is by giving back financially.

- Spontaneous giving no preparation but usually a spur-of-the moment such as through giving to disaster relief efforts.
- * <u>Intentional giving</u> giving on a regular basis like giving because it feels right.
- * <u>Planned giving</u>- making a significant gift financially as a strategy. Planned or intentional giving can include cash, required minimum distribution from IRAs (if 71-1/2 or older), life insurance, stocks, beneficiary proceeds, etc.
